A: Funding social justice -

what is the role of community foundations?

Speakers include: Nicole Lilauwala from UKCF, Dawn Shackels from Community Foundation for Northern Ireland (CFNI) and Eliza Baring from Civic Power Fund. This session will look at the role of funders in supporting and advancing social justice in communities. We will hear why CFNI calls itself a social justice organisation and how this is reflected in their work. Civic Power Fund will present the Funding Justice 2 report on the state of UK social justice funding, where the gaps are and how to address them.

B: The art of storytelling

Speakers include: Adam Lopardo from Community Foundation Tyne & Wear and Northumberland (CFTWN), Tracey Gyateng from 360Giving, Melissa Murdock from Heard, Colin Grist and Thomas Nadin from Few and Far. 360Giving and CFTWN will explore how data can be used to evidence powerful narratives and Heard will showcase their approaches to solution-focused storytelling using real-life experiences. The session will include an interactive panel discussion on practical steps, featuring Few and Far.

C: Philanthropy workshop - engaging professional advisors

Speakers include: Karen Morris from Community Foundations for Lancashire and Merseyside (CFLM), Zoë Coltart from Community Foundation for Surrey, Rachel Vinton from Kent Community Foundation and Rebecca Biggs from Berkshire Community Foundation. In this interactive workshop, our speakers from across the network will share their insights and top tips for engaging professional advisors in a development capacity. In table discussions, participants will be able to discuss key areas and share experiences with each other.

D: Progressive grant making - inspiring examples from those walking the walk

Speakers include: Orla Black from CFNI, Ben Cairns from Institute for Voluntary Action Research (IVAR), Marcia Asare from Walcot Foundation and Jennie Richmond from Impact Works. Speakers will highlight inspiring examples of progressive grant making. Walcot Foundation and IVAR will share insights on how to initiate conversations around transforming grant making and the benefits of adopting a learning-focused, long-term approach.

A: Designing inclusive national programmes

Speakers include: Jenny North from the Clothworkers' Foundation, Kita Ikoku from Clear Thinking Consultancy, Ugo Ikokwu from Trust for London, Alex Hayes from New Philanthropy Capital and Damilola Bamidele from UKCF. Join Trust for London and the Clothworkers' Foundation as they share insights on designing inclusive grant making through a reparative lens. Learn how to evolve funding practices to deeply integrate equity, with Clear Thinking Consultancy guiding the discussion. Participants will leave with actionable steps to make their programmes more equitable.

B: Integrating climate into our everyday work

Speakers include: Jane Cabutti from Environmental Funders Network (CFN), Pete Barrett and Ross Wilson from CFTWN, and Stacey Tillott from Kent Community Foundation. CFN will discuss how to tackle climate change at a local level, debunking myths and showcasing the impact of community action. The session highlights the importance of funders' commitment to climate change and features inspiring examples.

A: Partnering with local authorities

B: Strengthening democracy through local journalism

Speakers include: Jonathan Heawood from Public Interest News Foundation (PINF), James Magowan from European Community Foundation Initiative (ECFI), Michelle Cooper from Point North and Teresa O'Connell from Are We Europe. This interactive session will focus on the critical role of local journalism in strengthening democracy and countering biased national news, and how targeted funding can evolve journalism and drive change. ECFI will share insights on the rise of the far right in Europe and how local news can help combat it, Are We Europe will showcase their innovative approach to using micro grants and design sprints, and PINF will talk about their work in supporting local media and journalism as a tool to support democracy. This session will include an interactive, table discussion element.

C: Re-imagining work - innovations and insights for the future

Speakers include: Becca Bowden from Community Foundation for Surrey, Vicky Hickey and Fiona Oliver from Wiltshire Community Foundation, Matt Till from Prospectus and Grace Perry from London Funders. In this session we will explore how the traditional concept of work is evolving. Discover how joint CEOs can effectively share leadership roles, the potential benefits of adopting a flexible work week and the importance of fostering more human and relational approaches in the workplace. This session will challenge conventional ideas and offer fresh perspectives on creating a more flexible and collaborative work environment.

D: Leading Al-confident organisations

Speakers include: Tim Cook from Al Confident and Jon Yates from Berkshire Community Foundation. This hands-on workshop will explore the strategic and operational impacts of artificial intelligence. The workshop will be packed with a mix of examples, deep discussion and everything you need to lead confidently through Al-related change, embrace innovation and put the right cultures in place. Tim Cook, founder of Al Confident and a former leader at the Government's Office for Artificial Intelligence, will explore the evolving Al landscape and its role in work and society.

A: Elevating young voices and empowering youth involvement

Speakers include: Francesca Mereta from ECFI and Assifero, Henry Allmand from Heart of Bucks Community Foundation, Caleb Jackson from Youth Endowment Fund and Emily Jones from Leeds Community Foundation. This session will highlight the vital role of youth in governance, decision making and community action to empower young leaders and drive change. ECFI will showcase innovative strategies that ensure young voices shape a more inclusive future, while Heart of Bucks will share their Young Futures Fund partnership. The Youth Endowment Fund will discuss ways in which youth leadership can tackle challenges, particularly in addressing violence.

B: Transforming local needs analysis

Speakers include: Stefan Noble and Katie Leach from Oxford Consultants for Social Inclusion (OCSI), Hannah Clay from Sussex Community Foundation and Margaret Firth from Wiltshire Community Foundation. This session will explore how community foundations can more effectively conduct local needs analyses. OCSI will share their approach to conducting local needs analysis, exploring the strengths and challenges. We'll also hear from Sussex and Wiltshire members on their strategies for understanding communities and using local data effectively to address local issues.

C: Sustainable private assets
- accessing strong returns
with a positive impact

Speakers include: Tom Montagu-Pollock and Emily Peterson from Cazenove. Many of the most exciting companies with the ability to transform our economies are only accessible through private (unlisted) markets. Did you know that an increasing number of investment clients are looking to incorporate impact investments to align with positive societal and environmental outcomes? In fact, the private impact market has grown by 63% since 2019 (Global Impact Investment Network). This session, led by Tom and Emily at Cazenove, will cover the why, what, who and how of investing in sustainable private assets.







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D: Building regenerative futures - community-led solutions for lasting change Speakers include: Giles Ruck from Foundation Scotland, Leah Black from Regenerative Futures Fund, and Annalee Holliday and David Beeby from Cumbria Community Foundation. Learn how Foundation Scotland's Edinburgh Regenerative Futures Fund is pioneering upstream, preventative funding and how Cumbria Community Foundation's Better Tomorrows programme has created over 40 new youth work positions, empowering young people and strengthening communities. This session will delve into field building, non-extractive learning, and innovative approaches to fostering long-term, community-driven change.
